Three key actions of Erasmus+

KA1

Learning mobility of individuals

Eg: study period or traineeship abroad for students, youth exchanges

KA2

Innovation and best practices

Opportunities for organisations to cooperate on a strategic level

KA3

Support for Policy Reform

Eg: meetings between young people and decision makers





Who benefits from Erasmus+?

Who can participate in Erasmus+?

Eligible countries are divided into two groups: programme countries and partner countries.

Programme countries can take part in all actions of Erasmus+.

They are all European Union countries and North Macedonia, Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway, Serbia and Turkey.

Partner countries can only take part in some actions. They are all other countries of the world

Zoom in on youth exchanges

What?

Groups of young people from different countries meet outside the school environment to undertake a programme of activities (workshops, debates, role plays), within or outside the EU

How old? 13-30 years old

How long? 5-21 days

How to apply?

Centralised activities (eg capacity building projects from KA2) are managed by <u>Education</u>, <u>Audiovisual and Cultural Executive Agency</u> in Brussels.

Centralised projects are larger and more strategic, designed to tackle specific issues throughout Europe and beyond.

Decentralised activities (eg. youth exchanges from KA1) are managed by the <u>National Agencies</u> which are located in each programme country, or National Erasmus+ Offices outside the EU.

The majority of these projects will be implemented on a national, regional or local level and focus on an exchange between countries.

Individual volunteering allows young people participate in the daily work of organisations for **2-12 months** (in cases for people with fewer opportunities as of 2 weeks) abroad or in their country of residence.

Volunteering teams are groups of 10-40 young people from at least two countries volunteering for a shorter period of 2 weeks to 2 months.

Accommodation, food, pocket money and travel costs for participants to and from the venue are covered.





Traineeships count as full-time work practice last and between 2-6 months (renewable once) in the organisation responsible for the traineeship abroad or in the participant's country of residence.

Jobs are full-time and last between **3-12 months** abroad or in participant's country or residence. They are paid for by the organisation employing the participant.

Participants' travel costs to and from the venue are covered. If travelling abroad, participants receive a small allowance to help them relocate and settle in.

Solidarity projects are initiated, developed and implemented by at **least five young people** who want to make a positive change in their local community having a clear European added value in mind for a period of 2-12 months.

One of participants takes a role of legal representative and submits the application (unless an organisation applies on behalf of the group). All participants have to be registered in the European Solidarity Corps database.





GEOGRAPHICAL SCOPE


Volunteering activities are open to

- EU Member States
- North Macedonia and Turkey
- Liechtenstein, Iceland and Norway
- Albania, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Kosovo, Montenegro, Serbia
- Armenia, Azerbaijan, Belarus, Georgia, Moldova, Ukraine
- Algeria, Egypt, Israel, Jordan, Lebanon, Libya, Morocco, Palestine, Syria, Tunisia
- Russian Federation

Jobs and traineeships are open to EU Member States

Solidarity projects are open to EU Member States, Turkey, North Macedonia and Iceland.





HOW DOES IT WORK IN PRACTICE?

Young people (age 17-30) register in the European Solidarity Corps database and are matched for projects by organisations. They can start a project when they are 18.

Quality labelled organisations select young people from the database for their projects

Conditions

- 18 years old
- Nationality of one of the 28 Member States
- Travel alone or in a group of friends
- Travel between 1 day and up to 30 days inclusive

When and how to apply?

- 2019 application rounds open online in May 2019 and in autumn 2019
- Link: https://europa.eu/youth/discovereu en
- Provide personal data and give more details about the trip
- Answer 5 quiz questions and a subsidiary question to rank applicants
- Lucky applicants are informed and their travel will be arranged according to their final requests
